Seaside Police Department 2018 Annual Report

A word from the Chief



In 2018 the police department was operating with more personnel, 18 of the 19 positions, than we have seen in the recent past due to vacancies being filled that had started to vacate in late 2015 for several reasons. Although one patrol position remains to be hired as 2018 came to an end, our remaining patrol staff were all solo, helping spread the work load more evenly than we have seen for a while. Our investigative unit has had three detectives assigned to work our major crimes and lengthier, more time consuming investigations and this unit is functioning very well. A fourth detective assignment remains on my list of future plans as I believe a detective assigned to work juvenile offenses and offer school resources is important to our department and community. The dispatch center was able to complete the hiring for all personnel and at the end of 2018 only 2 of the 8 dispatchers remain in training, but are expected to be solo in the spring.

We are currently working and reporting our crime statistics in the NIBRS (National Incident Based Reporting System). This is a change from the previous crime reporting system and as I have reported in the past year or two, this new system has presented some challenges as we navigate this new way to report. Some statistics will look worse than in years past, but as I explain in the presentation you will see that some Part I and Part II offenses have been combined in the NIBRS reporting, which changes our numbers in serious crimes (felonies) versus misdemeanor.

2019 has been entered into with enthusiasm by our staff and with many fresh faces to our patrol and dispatch operations we are preparing our next generation of public servants. We want to continue to provide quality public safety to our citizens and guests who visit Seaside and we prepare year round by keeping our staff current with training requirements as well as additional related training. Members of our department continue to stay involved in community outreach efforts and we continue to strive to meet our mission to provide the community with safety and security through the highest level of professionalism, ethical, and integrity based services.

So how do OUCR and ONIBRS compare?

NIBRS vs. SRS crime statistics:

Prior to 2018, reported statistics using the Uniform Crime Reporting (UCR) Program's Summary Reporting System (SRS). The SRS used a hierarchy to decide which offense to report. In the hierarchy system, only the highest or most serious offense is reported on each case. NIBRS requires all unique offense types be reported on a case. The different reporting processes prevent any crime statistics prior to 2018 from being compared to current NIBRS data.

Example 1:

During an argument an offender threatens two people with a handgun.
 Threats with a weapon are considered aggravated assault.

 Two aggravated assault offenses would be counted for the incident, one for each victim.

Example 2:

• A car is broken into. The stereo is stolen as well as a gym bag and some spare change. The stolen stereo is considered theft of motor vehicle parts or accessories and the gym bag and change are considered theft from motor vehicle. One offense of theft of motor vehicle parts or accessories and one offense of theft from motor vehicle would be counted on this incident for a total of two larceny offenses.



Dispatch

It was another excellent year for Dispatch. In January of 2018 I was promoted to the Communications Manager after 12 years with the Department. Dispatch is full of hardworking and dedicated individuals who want to provide the best service to the community and our subscriber agencies. I am proud to call them my coworkers.

Seaside's Dispatch Center is budgeted for a staff of eight. We not only perform the tasks of 9-1-1 and police/fire dispatch, but also agency receptionist, records and evidence management. Our service population is approximately 30,000 people. We primarily dispatch for:

Seaside, Gearhart, Cannon Beach and Hamlet Fire Departments
Seaside, Gearhart, and Cannon Beach Police Departments
As necessary, we dispatch for Oregon State Police, Clatsop
County Sheriff's Office, State Forestry and U.S. Coast Guard.

- Sent and graduated all 3 dispatchers to the Basic Telecommunicators academy at DPSST.
- Graduate the Communications Manager from the Supervisory academy at DPSST.




Dispatch Highlights


- In 2018 dispatch:

- Dispatched 2,334 Fire and Rescue Calls for Service. Down -1% from last year.


Continuing Education

- Dispatch had 686 hours of continuing education for 8 Dispatchers / 911 operators.


